

NEW BRIGGATE HIGH STREET HERITAGE ACTION ZONE

New Briggate and the Grand Quarter are part of the New Briggate High Street Heritage Action Zone. This is a government-funded scheme to celebrate and breathe new life into High Streets across the country and will last until 2024.

St Johns Church was built by John Harrison who was a merchant and one of the richest and most well-known citizens of Leeds in the 1600s.

What kind of merchant was he?


Walk into the churchvard

St Johns Church is the oldest surviving place of worship in Leeds city centre and was built in 1632.

It is grade I listed which means and has the same status as the Houses of Parliament and Leeds Town Hall and it is older than both of them! Look up! What can you see above the church door?

Walk through the churchyard into

Merrion Gardens Merrion Gardens were laid. out in 1932 by Wades Charity.



CLUE - it's not as old as you think! Answer the questions to win a prize!



St Johns House is mock timber framed building, now used as a bar. Which year do you think it was built? (the answer isn't obvious – just have a quess!)

Walk out of the

the gates and

turn right onto

Merrion Street

A: Continue along Merrion Street, cross the road to the lower part beyond

Merrion Street today is full of bars and restaurants, but in the past these were houses

and shops. At one time, there was a cinema in the **Grand Arcade** building on the right hand

side of the street (if you're looking downhill). Can you tell what the cinema was called?

CLUE - look on the wall on that side of the street

Walk to the end of Merrion Street and turn right and right again into the Grand Arcade

The Grand Arcade is a really lovely Victorian shopping arcade, just like the ones lower down Briggate.

> Originally it was built on 'H' plan with two arcades of shops, but



only one survives now. Inside the arcade is a mechanical clock. Can you see who it was made by?

Walk uphill through the arcade, and stop and look back at the front from outside

Above the main entrances are panels of colourful faience tiles which were made by a famous local tile manufacturer Burmantofts. They were a nationally important company in the 1800s. The shimmer they created in their glazes was popular all over the CLUE - look

closely at the

front of the

building

world. What does the lettering above the arches say?

A:

Cross over New Briggate into the small cobbled vard opposite

Nash's is a chip shop today, but did you know that the building is actually one of the oldest houses in Leeds? When it was built in 1720, by the

merchant Matthew Wilson, it was a very fashionable townhouse. In 1817 the building was bought by a Mr Richard Kemplay who gave it a new use.

What was that use?

Walk along New Briggate to the row of shops opposite the theatre

3 23-51 New Briggate – these buildings were built in the late 1800s and have always been shops with a hotel or housing above. There is evidence of the old shop-fronts which used to be there. One of them has a carved animal head on the bracket. What animal is it?



Cross New Briggate or look back at Leeds Grand Theatre and Opera North from where you are

Leeds Grand Theatre & Opera North building opened in 1878. It has a very ornate and flamboyant frontage, which is often found in theatres and is typical of the Victorian era. Take a look at their programme of upcoming events.

Is there anything you'd like to see?

Why not finish your tour by popping into one of the cafés or bars on New Briggate to have a rest and think about any questions you haven't answered.
